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



It has been a pleasure to visit them and hear about all the interesting things they have been doing. We have had pupils in retail, schools and nurseries, law firms, riding stables, pharmacies, hospitals and the university to name but a few. Many pupils were enjoying their experiences so much they did not want to come back to school. Others were finding it quite tiring, especially when working with younger children. It is now time for them to start researching the next stage of their learning journey post-16.

As part of work experience, Intu has been working in the urology unit at the City Hospital. 

Creating Connections



Parking

We would like to take the opportunity to once again ask for your support and assistance in making the area near our Academy safe for pupils and in being considerate for local residents. Please see the guidance below about collecting your children from school.

1. The independence and exercise your daughter would gain in making her own way home are important life skills. Please consider whether this would be a possibility.
2. If you do need to collect your daughter, please try to park well away from the main entrances to the academy and the junction between Robins Wood Road and Prestwood Drive.
Parking further along the road towards Aspley Lane would really help.
3. Please do not park in front of residents' houses. We have had incidents where people have been asked to move so residents can access their drives and have been abusive in return. This is totally unacceptable and an appalling example to be setting our pupils.
4. Please do not stop in the middle of the road to allow your daughter to get into your car or make U-turns. Robins Wood Road is busy at this time and people get frustrated when they are delayed. This can lead to erratic decision-making and driving; further endangering our pupils.
5. Please do not mount the pavement near pedestrians. Many people do this to try to ease congestion but it further endangers pupils.
6. Please be considerate of other road users. We have had situations when people have blocked the road rather than giving way to other vehicles, thinking only of themselves.
