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Operating Procedures

Pupils have done a commendable job this term in following our operating procedures by sticking to their bubbles and zones. However, it has meant that some pupils have not had access to science laboratories, PC rooms and specialist technology rooms and this has an impact on the curriculum we can deliver.

Given that it is still not clear when we will be able to fully return to normal, we are keen to make some adjustments to the way we are currently operating to further improve the delivery of our curriculum and ensure pupils are not further disadvantaged by this pandemic.

All of our planning is in line with the latest guidance from the DfE and Public Health England. The main changes will be the implementation of a one-way system around the school buildings and some different cleaning procedures to sanitise classroom surfaces in between lessons. We will retain staggered arrival and departure times, staggered lunch times, separate outside zones for pupils at break and lunch time and use of face coverings.

Full details will be available on our website soon. We will notify you as soon as they are published and we will be available to answer any queries and listen to any concerns.

The success or failure of any of our operating procedures relies on our pupils carefully following the rules for our region's Covid Alert Tier and the Hands, Face, Space, Be Alert guidance in school.

Parking and Road Safety

1. The independence and exercise your daughter would gain in making her own way home are important life skills. Please consider whether this would be a possibility.

2. If you do need to collect your daughter, please try to park well away from the main entrances to the academy and the junction between Robins Wood Road and Prestwood Drive.

Parking further along the road towards Aspley Lane would really help.

3. Please do not park in front of residents' houses. We have had incidents where people have been asked to move so residents can access their drives and have been abusive in return. This is totally unacceptable and an appalling example to be setting our pupils.

4. Please do not stop in the middle of the road to allow your daughter to get into your car or make U-turns. Robins Wood Road is busy at this time and people get frustrated when they are delayed. This can lead to erratic decisionmaking and driving; further endangering our pupils.

5. Please do not mount the pavement near pedestrians. Many people do this to try to ease congestion but it further endangers pupils.

6. Please be considerate of other road users. We have had situations when people have blocked the road rather than giving way to other vehicles, thinking only of themselves.







PSHE Events Term One

PSHE days are held throughout the year for each year group. They are pertinent to the needs of our pupils and the current issues in our community and society. In addition to our tutorial time, each year group has a day off timetable to explore some of these topics. We also have one-off workshops that are delivered throughout the year, with many external agencies delivering on different topics. Our goal is to help our pupils develop important life skills, becoming more employable and better equipped for life beyond school and to be happy, well round citizens. We have held the Year 7 PSHE Day so far this year; workshops included:

- Black History awareness delivered by The Next Generation Movement
- Healthy Relationships delivered by Equation
- Resilience and Mindfulness delivered by an Education Mental Health Practitioner
- Puberty and menstruation delivered by Nottingham University Outreach programme

We asked some of our students what they enjoyed the most about the PSHE day; they said:

"Getting taught about people we didn't know about. I liked that Jenelle was showing us clips of people arguing about Black Lives Matter. I liked the clip of the people campaigning. Jenelle answered all of our questions and it gave us stuff to think about."

"I enjoyed placing statements in healthy, unhealthy or sometimes unhealthy, to determine what is going on in different types of relationships."

"I liked the information they gave us about what to do when we get our period. I liked when they answered our questions, as we learnt a lot about the menstrual cycle which helped us."

"I enjoyed learning the calming exercises, breathing is important for our mindfulness."

As part of a way to make our pupils aware of Hate Crime, we had our Community Police Officer come into school to deliver a workshop on Hate Crime and Law to all our Key Stage 3 students. The aim of this workshop was to educate our pupils more about the law and the consequences of some of our actions, with particular reference to racial hate crime.

We asked some of our pupils what they learnt or found the most interesting from the workshop, they said:

"I was most surprised about the length of sentences in the UK and the kinds of things which are illegal - 2 year sentence for punching someone, bad language, consent, you can go to jail at the age of 10, and being horrible to disabled people is a crime etc. "

"I was shocked about stories of killing people for what they wear."

"Yes I found it useful because it helped me learn what do to and what not to do in a hate crime situation; I was surprised at not being able to touch people."

Upcoming events

On 26 February Year 10 will be taking part in a Crime and Safety Awareness day called Prison Me! No Way" (this is the rescheduled date due to the lockdown in the summer term). We know the girls are eager to catch up with this! They get to see and hear real life stories from prisoners; they get to explore a prison cell; they learn about being safe online; they take part in a drama role play about being streetwise and a few other optional workshops which we will confirm nearer the time. Year 11 PSHE Day is 4 March and Year 10 PSHE Day is 23 March. The focus for both will be on Healthy and Unhealthy Relationships and other topics that are pertinent to each of the year groups at the time. The PSHE focus for all of Term 2 will be on Healthy and Unhealthy Relationships. 


Equality

At NGA we try to celebrate our diversity. We are so lucky to have pupils and staff from such a wide variety of different races, faiths and backgrounds - from countries all around the world. Our curriculum teaches about inequality and our policies state that we won't accept it, but we are committed to doing more. To challenge the present requires our pupils to understand the struggles of the past, to properly appreciate each other's culture and heritage and to have pride in who we are. As a school we understand that we are an essential part of the ongoing process of change. We continually reflect on our policies and curriculum and implement change where needed. There is no place for prejudice, of any kind, in any society or community and we will not tolerate it in ours.

Back in July, like a lot of things, the Black Lives Matter movement acted as a catalyst for us to really be held accountable for the change that we want to see in our community and our curriculum. The first step we took in July was creating a staff Curriculum Equality Group. The role of this group aims to challenge, support and respond to subject curricular, to be the voice of the community and to facilitate change. We will highlight the protected characteristics in accordance with The Equality Act: age; disability; gender reassignment; race; religion or belief; sex; sexual orientation; marriage and civil partnership; and pregnancy and maternity. We will also create resources for staff and pupils to discuss and will facilitate training so that all our community feels empowered, confident and knowledgeable enough to have discussions about them all.



Faculties have been revisiting their individual curricula, identifying changes to the literature we read and the topics we cover and finding ways to better highlight the diversity of key contributors to their field.

Last month we started a Year 9 Equality group; so far we have discussed why they wanted to be

there and what they wanted to get from the group. Our intention is to research, discuss and create a resource for the year group about what they think will help in understanding racism. We have expanded that now and the first Year 10 Equality group session was due to take place on Tuesday 2 December; it will be run in a similar way, so if you still want to get involved then please send a message to <u>curriculumequality@nottinghamgirlsacademy.org</u>.

An important part of this is educating ourselves and a starting point for us has been to invest in some reading regarding race, bias, discrimination, equality and inspirational people.

Parent and Student Council Summaries

NGA Student Council

At the beginning of the term, pupils in each year group had to nominate themselves or vote for others as to whom they wanted to be a Tutor Representative. They were then elected during tutor time and, from this process, two Tutor Representatives were put forward to be on the Student Council team for this year.

So far this term we have had one online meeting; the girls have a Teams channel whereby they can communicate anything they would like to as feedback arises. Our first round of questioning was initially to identify our key strengths, any constructive criticism and suggestions for improvements in individual year groups. Some key points that were raised:

- Lessons are all on one floor which is nice as it wastes less time going from lesson to lesson on different floors.
- The teachers are doing their very best to make sure that everyone is on the same level and any gaps of learning (particularly from lockdown) are filled.
- School is handling the situation well and makes sure that everyone is safe and sound by constantly reminding us about the measures, to wear masks; there are a lot of hand sanitisers for us to use.
- When pupils need help and support from their specific teacher and they do not want the whole class to be there, then it is difficult for them to speak to their specific teacher as the teacher's breaks and lunchtimes are different so they are unable to meet and have a 1 to 1.
- Lack of outdoor seating in the winter weather.
- We want to use PE time for revision, for triple science if not all year 11 pupils.

Action around the pupil's development points have been shared with all staff and pupils; some changes such as an ordering system for the canteen and outdoor seating, are already being researched and concerns regarding 1:1 feedback have been highlighted to staff.

The discussions have been successful so far and they will continue to run twice a term so that pupils can share their voice and we build the community together.

NGA Parent Council

We have created a small group of parents this term; at different times in the year we will ask for feedback about certain events, changes in the curriculum or for general feedback on how things are being received in our community. The first round was the same as the student council questions; some key points that were raised:


- Your pastoral care and the way you create a positive learning environment is paramount to the girl's educational journey.
- You seem to deal with every issue swiftly regardless of what year it affects and keep my daughter up to date. I also think that additional tutor time has helped her settle in.
- Whilst there is a focus on performing well and meeting targets, my perception is that the school puts the girls' needs above the desire to hit targets.
- In relation to anxieties and potential decline in mental health experienced by pupils, what support is there for them and is this communicated to them?
- It would be nice to see in these difficult times how to understand what level my daughter is at so that we can support her with anything she needs help with, as she is in year 7.
- I personally cannot imagine what it is like being a pupil, teacher or supporting staff in these unusual times. If some context could be provided, that would help.

We welcomed the positive feedback at such an exhausting point in the first term. Our staff are working tirelessly, and we appreciate the support. Just to confirm, there has been an abundance of mental health signposting, resources, support sent out to our pupils, almost weekly, and with posters around the school to remind them.

Citizens UK Update





This year we have continued our work with Citizens UK; we have switched the focus from Road Safety to Equality. Nottingham Citizens organise communities to act together for social justice and the common good, developing the leadership capacity of their members so they can hold our cities' decision-makers to account on the issues that matter to them. Nottingham Citizens will be working closely with our two Equality Groups to ensure that we learn how to challenge racism or any other kind of discrimination in the right way, that we learn perspective and respect for differing opinions and that we channel our emotions in the right way. What a journey it has been so far!

Protests

We could not be any prouder of our three students, Sanaa, Amira, and Judaea. In the summer they launched a structural racism team and on 8 August, about 80 other people gathered in St. Ann's on the site of the 1958 riots to publicly share stories and testimonies. They began to hold the Police and Crime Commissioner, as well as the Local Authority of education, to account and made them make some commitments on working alongside with us.



Thank you so much for your continued support; the fundraising events really bring our community closer together.


