



Upcoming STEM Events Next Term



Mrs Saunders achieved the revalidation status of the Careers Mark Award in December, in the middle of a pandemic; that alone is something to be recognised and commended. Diligent as ever, she never stops. Mrs Saunders is always exploring different ways to make sure we are meeting all the Gatsby Benchmarks and that the provision of careers education and guidance is the best that it can be for all of our students. She leads other staff that help her on this journey, and she empowers them to be innovative and try different platforms to share information and personalise each year group's educational experience.

Mrs Saunders is passionate about improving the provision of the school year on year; to aid this she regularly seeks feedback through evaluation with our stakeholders, students, parents, council members and employers. Her team use destination data to ensure we are meeting students' needs by minimising the number of students that are not in education, employment or training. 1:1 with our CEO of Greenwood Academies Trust - Wayne Norrie

Sanaa (year 13) works as lead organiser to our Citizens' Academy group and a young leader with Nottingham Citizens. Through her work with Nottingham Citizens, she wrote to Mr Norrie and asked if he had time to talk to her about his interests and passions; he was only too happy to oblige. Here is her write up of the event:

On the 3 February I had a very honest, inspiring and wonderful time with Mr Norrie. He is such an amazing, great CEO and he put me at ease straightaway. I just want to share my gratitude to sir for taking time out of his afternoon in having this 1:1 with me, telling jokes and making the atmosphere light! Thank you to Mrs Gangneux for also setting this 1:1 up and for supporting me. Thanks to Heidi and Pete from Nottingham Citizens for teaching me how to have 1:1s and the importance of having 1:1s in community organising. A special thanks to Heidi for also preparing me for this.

The 1:1 couldn't have gone any better! I learnt many things from this 1:1 conversation such as the best part about sir's job is "Going into academies to work with students, staff and headteachers" he's really missing this at the moment! He has to make a lot of decisions and has a budget in which he has to make sure he's spending it really wisely and helping students to reach their full potential, but also helping staff who might want to go on training courses or who might want to develop because we're all learning every single day. The visions around the schools that sir has got in the Trust is that he wants "Everybody to leave feeling confident and being able to read because if a child leaves primary school not knowing how to read, then their chances of going onto becoming someone successful are very slim". He just wants everyone to have an equal shot. Sir wants us "To be articulate, get the best grades possible for ourselves and to just be a really rounded person where we are able to speak to people and can feel comfortable in different people's presence whilst knowing our place and worth in society, to go out and be our own unique self." We went on further to talk about what makes us angry when we look around our city, where sir spends his time, energy and money and I'm sure you already know what answer sir gave... his children! We then went on to talk about what sort of curriculum we felt was important and I learnt a very special lesson from sir. It was... did you know that the most important person that got Neil Armstrong (the first person on the moon) into space, was the cleaner because if the cleaner didn't clean up the rocket then it would not have flown! The lesson behind this is to treat and respect everyone around you no matter who they are or what they do as a job. Thus, to recognise everyone's part in helping you get to where you are today. We had lots of different questions about you and how you have gotten to the position you hold, so we thought this would be a good opportunity to ask you yourself!


The main questions we had were:

National Careers Week Round Up

This year we enjoyed National Careers Week virtually, but that didn't stop us! We had access to a new employer panel every day, each with 3 speakers in different related professions. Our speakers discussed their roles, career journeys and what opportunities there are for young people in each of their sectors. In this, they discussed the future of work, the skills that made them successful and shared their top tips for young people considering careers like theirs.



On Monday, KS3 had the opportunity to hear from Mr Norrie and Baasit Siddiqui from Gogglebox. Mr Norrie spoke about his education and career path, which at points were really challenging, and why he is so passionate about making our schools better. Former teacher, Baasit, spoke a lot about why it is important to make good connections with others, and spoke about how he built his own education company off the back of Gogglebox notoriety.

The first half of the week also held talks from healthcare workers, such as a Scientific Investigator, a Healthcare Scientist Technologist, and a male Nurse, who is the chair of 'Men Into Nursing Together'. This was followed by talks from those hired in the technical world, including people who work in Associate Directing, Site Reliability for Google, and a Business Programme Manager intern. Nadine, the intern, had a particularly interesting point of view as she was right at the start of her career, which is something we hear about less often, but somewhere we have all/will all experience!

Later in the week we heard about Creative Careers, including a talk from Matt, a video producer and editor, who has worked in the charity sector. We also heard from a TV Director and an Architect with qualifications from both Cambridge University, and MIT in the USA, who had worked in Beijing at one point! We also watched our Civil and Public Service Career panel where we heard from a Police Sergeant, a Geoscience Technical Advisor, and a Deputy Head of News. We heard about how the government work with the press and how security clearance helps keep our country safe. Year 11 had a Q&A session with Confetti College, NGA Sixth Form and Nottingham College about their next steps where we spoke about best and worst case results day scenarios, college life and how to link college courses to your future careers.

In the final panel, we heard from people in the transport and aviation industries, including a Manufacturing Engineer, and Greenwood Academies Trust alumnus, Frida, who currently works for Rolls Royce. We also got to find out about life as the first and (currently) only female pilot in the Royal Air Force Aerobatic Team.
