

Careers Message Part One

Welcome to a brand new year of careers at Nottingham Girls Academy! We in the careers department have gotten off to a flying start this year, starting with the delivery of an assembly for all year groups, so that they all knew the careers focus for their school year. This assembly also introduced our shiny new program, Startprofile, a website which allows pupils to explore the world of work, make study choices, write CVs and prepare for interviews. It can also be used to apply for apprenticeships, college courses and work experience. In this session we introduced our 'Careers Drop in Sessions', run for four lunchtimes a week, where pupils are welcome to pop by and speak to a Level 6 qualified careers professional about their options for further and higher education, and career thereafter. We've had a brilliant uptake on this so far and are getting a real picture of the high aspirations of many of our pupils, including law, forensic science and owning their own salon!

These themes have been continued into Year 11's one to one careers guidance sessions. Year 11 have been discussing their post-16 pathways, and starting to make big decisions about their future! All of Year 11 will be offered a 1:1 guidance session by January. Year 13 have also been getting in touch to talk about their future, including UCAS enquiries and questions about apprenticeships.

Our Year 11 careers day took place on October 5. They took part in an interview skills workshop, were introduced to StartProfile and had workshops from three visiting agencies. Our visitors were AskApprenticeships, who covered apprenticeships and CV skills, DANCOP with a workshop on further and higher education options, and every group got the opportunity to speak to a representative from Nottingham College about their course options, pathways and application process. The careers team really enjoy delivering our drop down days, and are excited to deliver to the Year 9s next, for their Bee Like Me day in November.

You can read an account of Hayat and Rasan's experience with Citizens summer academy here:

Last summer, I participated in the summer academy with people across the country interested in making change. I did this with Citizens UK with Nottingham Citizens, an alliance working with different institutions to make the UK a better place, without any clue what to expect or encounter. At first I found it daunting to join a call with people I didn't know, especially since I was barely involved with Nottingham Citizens previously other than in Equality Group.

To my surprise, the sessions were relaxed and insightful. I talked to young people interested in similar things to me and I learnt stories about people making change of different ages, genders and religions. The sessions taught us the key methods of making change and the importance of doing it correctly through 1-2-1's and building relational power. I found the mentors interesting and I loved the fact there was a different person with a new story each week.

My time at the Summer Academy is one of the most valuable extra-curriculars I have participated in and I'll apply what I've learnt in campaigns going forward.

My time at NC Summer School, was truly unforgettable!

I felt like I was a powerful, future leader. The Summer Academy taught me that no matter your gender, race, ethnicity, and age, you can create a change. You can never be too young nor too old. My favourite session, which was a hard decision to make, was the relational power session, where we learnt that a group of teenage guys, helped organise a halal Nando's. Proving again, that you don't need to have the strongest connections to make a change but just surround yourself with those who will be with you during every obstacle and celebration. As Mahatma Gandhi once said, "Be the change that you wish to see in the world."


