Nowruz (also called Novruz, Navruz, Nooruz, Nevruz, Nauryz depending upon country) is an UN-recognised New Year holiday that marks the Spring Equinox. It is celebrated by hundreds of millions of diverse communities around the world. How do people celebrate Nowruz?

For several weeks leading up to Nowruz, families get to work cleaning their homes from top to bottom.

Decluttering homes and getting rid of dirt means they are ready to start afresh in the new year.

A bonfire is lit the evening before the Persian New Year, and fireworks and firecrackers are set off.



It is traditional to sing the words, "my yellow is yours, your red is mine," into the fire, to replace problems and illness with health and energy for the new year.

The evening before Nowruz begins, children knock on neighbours' doors, noisily banging pans with spoons and neighbours then give them pastries, sweets or nuts.

On the thirteenth day, it is considered bad luck to stay inside, so families head out to the countryside, parks or cities to spend the day outdoors.

At NGA we will have several displays and posters around the school to highlight to pupils this festive celebration.





FORENSIC SCIENCE

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
Forensic Science Week 7-9 February 2023

Students had to solve a crime of who stole Miss Mahmood's stash of chocolates. Each day they had to pick up clues and reach to a conclusion.

Day 1: They revealed it wasn't Mrs Kotze because she did not use the same pen that was used on the ransom note. They carried out chromatography to test it out.



They also had spoken to a student from Nottingham Trent University who studied Forensic Science. They tried out the biohazard suit. The picture shows Ifza and Arouge.

Day 2: There was white powder at the scene which Mrs Tattershall and Mr Marshall had used that day, but they quickly ruled out Mrs Tattershall as the footprints was too big. They also found blood splatters at the scene that was wiped away. They used UV light to spot it.



Day 3: They ruled out Mr Stapleton as they found the fingerprints matched Mr Marshall's fingerprints. They used carbon powder to identify them.

Evidence

The Culprit was Mr Marshall. He didn't have to clear away his practical as Mrs Tattershall clears away all the teachers' practicals. He was carrying the same white powder as he used in his practical session. We noticed there was blood splatter on the desk. He happened to cut his finger and wore a plaster. His footprints matched one of the footprints found at the crime scene. That last piece of evidence was looking at the fingerprints on the Chocolate Stash beaker. Only Mr Marshall's and Miss Mahmood's fingerprints were found.




Music Exams Success
